

KPD Mental Health Division

The Kyle Police Department's Mental Health Division uses a co-responder model that pairs specially trained officers with licensed mental health professionals to provide compassionate, safe, and effective crisis response. Supervised by a Mental Health Sergeant, the team includes Mental Health Officers and Mobile Crisis Care Coordinators who respond to mental health calls, de-escalate crises, connect individuals to care, and provide follow-up support. Through collaboration, education, and community engagement, the division promotes safety, dignity, and long-term wellness over criminalization.

Hours of Operation

The KPD Mental Health Division currently operates Monday-Friday from 9:00-7:00 pm. If you have a mental health emergency always call 911. What is Mental Health?

Mental health is just as important as physical health. It encompasses emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act, and how we handle stress, relate to others, and make choices. Mental health issues are common, and many people recover fully with treatment and support.

Warning Signs of a Mental Health Concern

- Drastic mood or behavior changes
- Social Withdrawal
- Difficulty functioning at work/school/home
- Thoughts, plans, or intent to self-harm or attempt suicide

What To Do If You're Concerned

- Talk openly and supportively with your loved one
- Avoid judgment and ultimatums
- Offer to help make a call or go with them to a first appointment

Make a Crisis Plan

Prepare in advance:

- List of medications and mental health history
- Contact info for doctors, case managers, or therapists
- Preferred hospital or treatment center

When Someone Refuses Help

Sometimes despite receiving support or reaching a crisis point, an individual may not be ready to receive treatment or implement change. It is important to:

- Stay as involved as possible, even when they resist or become oppositional
- Document changes in behavior to share with professionals
- Contact your Local Mental Health Authority (LMHA) for guidance

Rights and Legal Information

What is an LMHA?

A Local Mental Health Authority (LMHA) is a governmental entity in Texas that provides and coordinates mental health services within a specific geographic area. They act as the primary point of contact for publicly funded mental health programs and manage resources for individuals with serious mental illness. LMHAs also offer crisis services and other support like medication management, counseling, and case management.

Who is the LMHA in Hays County?

The LMHA in Hays County is Hill Country Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Centers (Hill Country MHDD).

Involuntary Commitments

Emergency Detention Order (EDO) – Allows a peace officer, without a warrant, to temporarily detain a person who may be a **danger to themselves or others** due to mental illness and **cannot or will not seek help voluntarily**. Once placed under EDO the person will be transported to the nearest appropriate mental health facility for a psychiatric evaluation. (HSC § 573.001)

Mental Health Warrant - Any adult (family, friend, doctor) can apply for a Mental Health Warrant to detain a mentally ill person if they believe the individual poses a **significant danger to themselves or others**. Once the application is complete, a judge will determine if the individual poses a danger to themselves or others. If so, the judge will issue a Mental Health Warrant for Psychiatric Examination, which a Mental Health Officer will serve before transporting the individual to a facility for evaluation. (HSC § 573.012)
