### **Heavy Equipment Safety and Operation Training**



The Parks Maintenance and Beautification teams recently completed a joint in-house training focused on safely operating key equipment such as zero-turn mowers, skid steers, and backhoes. This hands-on training highlights Kyle Parks and Recreation's ongoing commitment to safety, efficiency, and teamwork across departments. By investing in regular training, the department equips staff to safely perform duties and effectively support well-maintained parks and public spaces for the entire community's enjoyment.



#### **Lake Kyle Nature Trail**

Kyle Parks and Recreation's Trails Team has officially assumed responsibility for maintaining approximately three miles of nature trails at Lake Kyle. Moving forward, the team will maintain these trails at a narrower width of 8–10 feet compared to the previously wider, fully mowed paths. This change allows adjacent areas to transition back into natural conservation zones.

Reducing the mowed footprint lowers fuel, equipment, and labor costs while minimizing long-term trail damage caused by soil compaction and erosion. It also supports habitat restoration by promoting native vegetation, reducing invasive species, and improving conditions for local wildlife.

This approach reflects the department's commitment to sustainable land management and efficient operations.



### Lake Kyle Fitness Court Update



Construction is moving forward at the Lake Kyle Fitness Court. The concrete pad and ADA-accessible sidewalk have been completed, and equipment installation is scheduled to begin on Friday, May 9, with work expected to take approximately three days.

Details about the upcoming ribbon-cutting ceremony will be shared soon, stay tuned!

### Family Services Prepares for Summer Camp and Engages the Community

The family services team continues to prepare for the start of summer camp. The Parent Handbook is being finalized to ensure families have all the essential details for a smooth experience. Staff also evaluated camp facilities, identifying areas for improvement as part of seasonal readiness efforts. Preparations for onboarding and training seasonal staff are also underway.

Outside of camp planning, Family Services hosted a pop culture-themed Trivia Night at Centerfield Bar. The event brought together community members for a fun and interactive evening. In the weeks ahead, the team will wrap up facility assessments and continue staff training preparations.

### **Kids Fishing Registration**

Registration for the June 7 Fishing Clinic at Lake Kyle opened on May 5 and accepts up to 72 participants. The registration fee is \$5 for residents and \$7 for non-residents. Each participant will receive rods, reels, and fishing equipment for the clinic. This event is held in partnership with the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TPWD), providing instructional-based activities focused on fishing skills and outdoor education. Space is limited, so early registration is encouraged.



### City of Kyle Aquatics Division: Pre-season Preparation and Staff Certification

This week, the Aquatics Division focused on preseason preparations to ensure a safe and efficient start to the pool season. Highlights included lifeguard recertifications, deep cleaning, and routine chemical balancing for safety compliance. A new point-of-sale (POS) desk was installed, chemical tanks were refilled, and staff completed a facility walkthrough with the Facilities team to identify repair needs. The week concluded with four team members becoming certified Lifeguard Instructors (LGIs), allowing them to lead future lifeguard and CPR trainings.





## Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) Lake Kyle Fish Stocking



On Monday, May 5, 2025, fisheries biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) stocked Lake Kyle with an estimated 1,200 bass fingerlings. These bass are the offspring of selectively bred fish from the ShareLunker program which uses trophy native bass from around the state to breed stronger stock. TPWD is continuing their efforts to build up the lake's fish populations, making it an even better spot for fishing. Grab your gear, head out to the water, and enjoy this exciting opportunity! Please keep in mind that Lake Kyle is "catch and release" only and the state fishing license regulations apply.

#### Social Squad Brings Art, Laughter, and Bingo Fun

The Kyle Parks and Recreation Department hosted its May Social Squad event, a monthly program designed for adults (18+) with disabilities to connect through inclusive and engaging recreational activities.

This month's gathering featured five rounds of Bingo, giving participants the chance to win small prizes while enjoying snacks and conversation. The second half of the evening introduced a group painting activity called "Switch Painting," where participants rotated canvases and contributed to each other's artwork. The result was a series of shared paintings that reflected the creativity and collaboration of the group.

### **Waterleaf Playground Survey**



### **Republic Drive Interior Renovation**

The new Parks and Recreation and Communication Department offices for the City of Kyle, located at 208 and 246 Republic Drive, are progressing well, and the project is nearing 90% completion. During the week of April 28, the contracting team completed the following installations: carpet, workspace countertop, ceiling insulation, ceiling tiles, wall trim, and started the data cable installation. The remaining items include the chain-link cage for maintenance supplies, warehouse ventilation, fiber optic connection, exterior signage, punch list, and final inspections. The project is scheduled to be substantially completed by mid-May.

### FM 1626 Ground Storage Tank & Pump Station Updates

The ARWA connection to FM 1626 is now complete, and testing of the Cla-Val pressure control system at the ARWA meter pad has also been successfully completed.

Once the Maxwell booster pump station reaches a pressure of 80 psi, the Cla-Val will become fully operational, allowing water to consistently flow from the ARWA meter pad into the ground storage tank, which is now ready and capable of accepting water.

In the meantime, ARWA has resolved previous SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) communication issues and is currently conducting testing to ensure system performance meets required standards.

As of now, the ground storage tank is actively receiving water from the ARWA meter pad.



### Plum Creek Retail Roads

Weather conditions impacted the construction schedule this week due to rain.

On Avenue A, crews have placed the roadway base material, which is now pending quality testing before further work can continue.

Over on Heroes, the subgrade has been lime treated to improve soil stability and is also awaiting testing.

Wastewater and waterline testing remains on hold and will resume once the weather improves and site conditions are safe for work.



## Waste Water Treatment Plant Access Road

Rainy weather has delayed portions of the construction schedule this week. Despite the conditions, progress continues on key drainage features.

Crews poured the concrete wings and aprons for the culvert near Heidenreich, which will help manage water flow in that area.

Additional culvert wings have been prepared for a concrete pour at the curve in the road.

Meanwhile, installation of cattle guards has been completed, enhancing safety and access control along the roadway.


### CR 158 Elevated & Ground Storage Tanks

At the CR 158 Ground Storage Tank (GST), crews have placed the plywood forms for the concrete dome, with rebar installation to follow.

Interior scaffolding has been fully set up inside the tank to support ongoing construction work.

The exterior coating of shotcrete was originally scheduled for the week of May 5th but has been delayed due to recent rain.

LANDMARK, the contractor handling key components of the project, is expected to mobilize on site in early June



# What is Scaffolding and Why Is It Used?



Scaffolding is a temporary structure built to give workers safe access to hard-to-reach areas during construction.

Inside large structures like ground storage tanks, scaffolding allows crews to work at different heights, especially for tasks like forming and pouring concrete domes or applying interior finishes.

It's carefully designed to support both workers and their tools, ensuring that construction can be done safely, efficiently, and with precision.
