La Verde Park Event Lawn – Maintenance Closure Progress Update



The lawn area at La Verde Park is progressing well in its second week. Grass growth is on schedule, with noticeable daily improvements in coverage and density. Once the lawn is established, the team will apply a targeted treatment to control and eliminate nut sedges, ensuring a healthy and uniform turf. Regular monitoring and care will support optimal growth during this establishment phase.

Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) Step Forward Day

On April 11, the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) hosted its annual Day of Service, bringing volunteers together to give back to local communities. This year marked the City of Kyle's first time participating in the event, with volunteers rolling up their sleeves for beautification projects at Gregg-Clarke Park. Efforts included removing netting and cleaning the hockey rink dasher boards, helping to refresh and revitalize this well-loved community space.





Certified Playground Inspector

The Parks and Recreation Department congratulates Matthew Boyd on his Certified Playground Safety Inspector (CPSI) certification.

On April 11, the department received official notice from the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) confirming that Matthew passed the CPSI exam on his first attempt. He completed the required training and passed the CPSI exam during the Texas Recreation and Park Society (TRAPS) State Conference, held February 24–26, 2025.

The CPSI program is the most widely recognized certification for playground safety in the U.S. It prepares professionals to inspect and evaluate playgrounds based on national safety standards, helping prevent injuries and ensure safe, high-quality spaces for children and families to enjoy.

Matthew's accomplishment reflects the department's continued investment in staff development and dedication to creating safer, more accessible parks for the community.

National Fitness Campaign - Fitness Court

The fitness court project broke ground on Monday, April 14. The crew is currently trenching and preparing the area for the foundation of the fitness pad. They expect to pour the concrete on Thursday, April 17, and complete the pad by Monday, April 21. Installation of the fitness equipment will follow approval of the pad construction.





208 & 246 Republic Drive (Park Administration Facility)

Both 208 and 246 Republic Drive renovations are continuing to make progress. The interior lighting installation is wrapping up at 208 Republic, and in a couple of days, the team will transition to 246 Republic Drive. Interior door frames are undergoing installation, and the contractor will have installed the carpet this week.

Conservation Team Update

On April 7, Matt Riojas, a new team member, joined the Native Landscape Team. Matt was originally with the Beautification team serving as a Park Technician and has been with the City of Kyle for 3 years.

This past week, the team dedicated time to acquiring plants from local native growers and City Limits Subaru, which will be planted in city parks and along trails. These efforts facilitated connections with local groups and organizations, highlighting the widespread enthusiasm for native plants and ecosystems.







Spring Sports in Full Swing: Kickball, Pickleball, and More Heat Up the Season

The Athletics team had an exciting week with 6 adult kickball league games on April 12 at Gregg-Clarke Park, featuring all 11 registered teams. The Pickleball Tournament was on the same day at Arden at Kohlers Crossing Apartments, drawing nine teams for a fun and competitive morning. Spring CoRec and Men's Softball Leagues are in full swing, with games drawing strong participation across both divisions. Looking ahead, the Tiny Tot Tri on April 26 has 37 participants registered, and T-ball league registration opens on April 14. Planning is also underway for a youth basketball camp in June with N3xt Athletics.













Kyle Market Days Kick Off with a Nature-Filled Start

The 2025 season of Kyle Market Days officially kicked off on Friday, April 12, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Mary Kyle Hartson Park, welcoming around 650 attendees with 47 vendors offering everything from handmade crafts to free sourdough bread. The Bill Cody Band performed.

The City of Kyle Water Conservation Department hosted a special booth with helpful tips on how residents can reduce water use at home. Kyle Parks and Recreation-Conservation Division offered expert guest lectures on "What Plants to Plant and When" and delighted visitors with a native plant giveaway.

Also joining the event were the Hays County Master Naturalists, who shared valuable information about local bird species and native plant life.

CR 158 Elevated & Ground Storage Tanks Updates:

- Preload to erect all GST walls Thursday April 17.
- Continuing electrical duct banks installation at Booster Pump Building.
- No work scheduled for Friday April 18.

Wastewater Treatment Plant Access Road:

- With the exception to culverts roadbed select fill has been placed.
- Geogrid placed with the exception to the structure areas.
- Base has been placed with the exception to the structure areas.
- Cattle guard has been placed and location grading around crossings are underway.
- Electric rough is underway.





FM 1626 Ground Storage Tank & Pump Station Updates:

- Hydrostatic and Chlorine residual testing start date April 14 for 8 days.
